1. Course Description:

Sociology is a course designed to give an understanding of the basic concepts of life in contemporary and historical issues. It allows students to examine Canadian and world sociological concepts and to participate in class work designed to enhance critical thinking. Issues that may be considered include the family, students and school, poverty, minority groups, women in society, labor and management, conflict, crime and deviance, punishment and rehabilitation, and what may be in store for us in the future.

2. Student Assessment:

- A. Course content, knowledge, and skills will be assessed on a daily basis throughout the semester by means of the numerical values listed below. The course will also incorporate skills devoted to grammar and English communication (reading, writing, and oral expression skills), to enhance independent thinking and learning while using both creative writing as well as a comprehensive knowledge of basic computer input.
- B. Assessment will include marks for participation, tests, assignments/projects (both homework and class work) as well as a formal examination at the end of the semester.

3. Evaluation:

- A. A mid-term progress report will be issued in November. The assigned mark will be based on tests, projects, and assignments and **may** include a mid-term comprehensive test or Research Assignment. **The Mid-Term Test or Research Assignment mark, will constitute 20% of the final mark.**
- B. Class work (tests, assignments, and projects,) from the mid-term report to the final exam, **will be valued at 50% of the final mark.**
- C. The final exam (a comprehensive exam based on the full semester's work), **will be valued at 30 % of the final mark.**

4. Communication Methods:

- A. Communication with parents/guardians will be through the use of formal **Report Cards**, **Attendance Reports**, and scheduled **Parent/Teacher** meetings. There is also a **Homework Page** located on the school website. <http://sacademy.cbv.ns.ca/> . If the need arises, further communications through telephone calls and personal meetings may be required.
